Here are some notes on the spelling skills we practised in today's lesson. You will also find an extension activity which you can complete in your own time.

THERE/THEIR/THEY'RE

These words are some of the most frequently mixed up homophones. Remember to check you've used the correct spelling when writing these words.

- There: Can be used as an adverb or pronoun. "The park is over there".
- Their: Can be used as a possessive adjective or possessive pronoun. "It's their netball".
- They're: Is a contraction of 'they are'. "They're heading to the park".

ROOTS, PREFIXES & SUFFIXES

Root words are the **primary lexical units of words.** They can form the basis of new words through the addition of prefixes and suffixes. For example:

Root Word = success Prefix = un Suffix = ful unsuccessful

There are some general rules which can help you spell words by breaking them down into prefixes, roots and suffixes. Remember, there will always be some exceptions to these rules!

Vowel Suffixes (e.g. ary, ist, ing, ed, er):

- Consonant endings of root words are often doubled e.g. bigger, cancelled.
- If the root ends in 'e', it's usually dropped before adding the suffix e.g. hoping, user.

Consonant Suffixes (e.g. ly, ful, less, tion):

- Generally, the root doesn't change if it ends in a consonant.
- There are some changes if it ends in a vowel or a 'y' e.g. friendliness.

Prefixes (dis, im, il, un, mis):

- Often create double letters at the start of words e.g. irrational, illegal, unnecessary.
